Cattle News from Producers:

The spring of 2017 has been very favorable for sellers of stocker calves and feeder yearlings headed to the feedyard. Many of these middle-sized to heavier weight steers are dollaring out from \$850 to \$1050 per head. At our Thursday auction on May 4^{th} , 500 to 600 pound steers sold with a high of \$172 and a weighted average price of \$156.38. Heifer mates sold with a high of \$168 and a weighted average price of \$137.30. Pretty nice averages considering there would be some lesser quality calves included in these categories.

In the feedlot sector, fat cattle have trended from the \$120's up into the \$130's and just recently, have seen highs of \$142 to \$146. That's good news for everyone and hopefully will help heal some past wounds for cattle feeders and feedyard owners.

Slaughter cow and bull prices have remained relatively steady with no big gains or losses in quite a while. Fewer packing houses than in years past seem to have ample supply. Thankfully, we have enough slaughter buyers that continue to remain competitive with one another. *Jody Frey, cattle sale mgr (325) 234-7895*

Sheep and Goat News:

The sheep and goat market has been wonderful so far in winter and spring of 2017. There has been lots of feed this winter which has allowed people to hold lambs and kids longer than normal and, no doubt, lighter runs of livestock through auctions has been a plus for market values. On May 2nd and 9th, all classes of sheep and goats except wooled feeder lambs started their seasonal value declines. Not only is it May when we normally start to see values decline, but both sales were near twice as large as previous weeks. The wooled feeder lambs have held strong due to an upturn in the price of the fat lambs going to the major packers and then going to traditional lamb markets. Both the profits from fat lamb sales to commercial lamb feeders and the thought of a shortage of fat lambs through August have given those lambs a boost.

In most of the sheep and goat raising areas, we have had above average rainfall going on three years now which have increased possible worm loads. You should keep that in mind and not allow your sheep or goats to go downhill like so many did two years ago. That advice applies to the hair sheep people as well. When tender feed is plentiful, your stock may look just fine, but as feed quality starts to change to the negative, you may not like what comes next as large egg counts begin to take over in the sheep and goats.

I have heard lots of bad news on the predator situation from the east, west and south. It seems we cannot win as there is danger the M44s may be taken away from Wildlife Services. This is a valuable tool in controlling varmints, especially coyotes. M44s take 3.5 times more coyotes than helicopters and snares and are more cost efficient, especially considering the cost of flight time. Keep after those varmints. We have valuable livestock but, only if we make it to market can we cash in.
